Often times, I hear people want to be an involved citizen and here is your chance. The Census comes around every 10 years and gives you the opportunity to speak for yourself and the members in your household by participating in the 2020 Census. Therefore, taking the opportunity to make your voice heard by participating in the 2020 Census is one small action with long term impact for our city. As a citizen of Carter Lake City, we need to insure every person is counted to assure we have accurate representation for our city. The information collected in the 2020 Census is used for allocating funds for items such as sales taxes, federal road fund, school district funding, and housing trust fund, and the list goes on. I cannot **stress** enough how this effects the revenue our city receives. The 2020 Census only takes a few minutes to complete. Please take the time and fill out the form.

With the cold coming to an end the parks are in great shape. Here is just a few projects which were completed by the park's crew this winter. Baseball field #4 is an infield space for practice. This is a great addition providing more field time for our teams to practice. In addition, we formed local soccer teams which is something we haven't been able to accomplish for several years. We have two soccer fields behind the library which were installed and are ready to go. We added rock to the lake shoreline and jetties, we painted inside the concession stands and restrooms, and we have installed new boat docks going in at the ramp. New playground equipment will be installed this summer plus many more programs.

The Public Works crews have put in some long days to get ahead of the possible high water that is anticipated this spring, thereby, causing servicing the infrastructure more difficult for the utility contractors hired to assist with this process.

This year has started off very busy for me not only with city business but I also serve as a Pottawattamie County Assessor Board member and a Pottawattamie County Emergency Management Commissioner which gives Carter Lake a voice at the county level. *Sincerely, Mayor Ron Cumberledge*

INFORMATION FOR FUTURE REFERENCE

AUTOMATED PHONE CALLS AND TEXT MESSAGE ALERTS FOR EMERGENCY NOTIFICATIONS

Pottawattamie County Emergency Management has agreed to assist us with providing emergency notifications via phone calls and text messages through the Alert Iowa system. This is an **OPT IN** system, which requires residents to sign up for notifications.

- 2. CLICK "SIGN UP FOR EMERGENCY ALERT"
- 3. COMPLETE FORM WITH YOUR INFORMATION
- 4. BE SURE TO SELECT CARTER LAKE TO RECEIVE CARTER LAKE NOTIFICATIONS.
- 5. IF YOU DO NOT HAVE A COMPUTER, CALL CITY HALL AND OUR STAFF WILL HELP YOU GET SIGNED UP.

BOIL WATER ADVISORY What does that mean?

If the Iowa DNR requires the City of Carter Lake to issue a **boil water** advisory, you should use bottled water or boil tap water because the water is, or **could be**, contaminated with germs that can make you sick.

STANDARD RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. Use bottled or boiled water for drinking, and to prepare and cook food.
- 2. If bottled water is not available, bring **water to a full rolling boil for 1 minute,** then allow it to cool before use.
- 3. Boil tap water even if it is filtered.
- 4. Do not use water from any appliance connected to your water line, such as ice and water from a refrigerator.

Handwashing

- 1. In many situations, you can use tap water and soap to wash hands. Follow the guidance from your local public health officials.
- 2. Be sure to scrub your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, and rinse them

well under running water.

3. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.

Bathing and showering

- 1. Be careful not to swallow any water when bathing or showering.
- 2. Use caution when bathing babies and young children. Consider giving them a sponge bath to reduce the chance of them swallowing water.

Brushing teeth

1. Brush teeth with boiled or bottled water. Do not use untreated tap water.

Washing dishes

- 1. If possible, use disposable plates, cups, and utensils during a boil water advisory.
- 2. Household dishwashers generally are safe to use if the water reaches a final rinse temperature of at least 150 degrees Fahrenheit (65.55°Celsius), or if the dishwater has a sanitizing cycle.
- 3. Sterilize all baby bottles.
- 4. To wash dishes by hand:
 - * Wash and rinse the dishes as you normally would using hot water.
 - * In a separate basin, add 1 teaspoon of unscented household liquid bleach for each gallon of warm water.
 - * Soak the rinsed dishes in the water for at least one minute.
 - * Let the dishes air dry completely before using again.

Laundry

1. It is safe to wash clothes as usual.

Cleaning

1. Use bottled water, boiled water, or water that has been disinfected with bleach to clean washable toys and surfaces.

Caring for pets

1. Pets can get sick by some of the same germs as people or spread germs to people. Provide bottled or boiled water after it has been cooled for pets to use.

- Furniture, household items, trash
- Empty paint cans will <u>ONLY</u> be accepted if the drivers can see that the paint is dried or absorbed with a substance like cat litter or saw dust.
- ALL TIRES Put tires inside dumpster at the Maintenance Shop on <u>Saturday ONLY</u>

- Construction Demolition materials (bricks, stones, concrete, concrete block or rubble, shingles, lumber, landscape timbers, siding, and drywall).
- Liquids (motor oil, antifreeze, paint, and household chemicals). Some service stations accept motor oil for recycling.



Every year, thousands of people needlessly lose their lives in motor vehicle crashes involving impaired drivers and motorcyclists. Last year, 327 of these alcohol-related crashes occurred during the St. Patrick's Day holiday.

SOBER* DRIVE

And the costs are not only death, disfigurement, disability or injury. There are significant financial costs as well - car repairs, hospital bills, legal fees, bail, higher insurance rates, fines, court costs and lost time at work. Not to mention the trauma and social stigma of being the guy who got busted for drunk driving. It's simply not worth it when there are so many ways to avoid it altogether.

· Designate a sober driver before you go out to drink.

DESIGNATEA

- If you become impaired and don't have a designated driver, call a cab, call a friend or family member, or take a bus.
- If you see a friend who is too drunk to drive, take their keys and call them a cab - or drive them home yourself (of course, only if you haven't been drinking).
- · Consider using your community's safe rides program.
- If you see a driver on the road that is obviously driving impaired, don't hesitate to call the law.

So, whether you're planning a night at the pub or partying with 5,000 of your closest friends in the parade downtown, you can't rely on the luck of the Irish to keep you safe. You have to make your own luck.

Flood Funding Signed into Law

On February 13, 2020 the Governor of Iowa, Kim Reynolds, signed into law SF2144. This is the crucial flood relief funding bill that was rushed through as one of the first bills of this session. Originally this bill offered \$20 million additional state funds federal funds for flood relief and mitigation. With the help of other House Democrats, I was able to move forward an amendment to this bill, while it was in the house, which leveed an additional million dollars bringing the total to

\$21,003,186.

I would have

loved to have the amended amount be larger for the recovery efforts but getting this million-dollar amendment took some convincing to get moved through. In the end the house had to agree to suspend standing rule to move this forward as fast as we could. Fortunately, the House was able to pass this on to the Senate who also passed it, and was landed on the Governor's desk to be signed. These additional funding dollars will not cover all of the damages and repairs. However, it is a good start towards furthering the completion of ongoing projects as we look forward to what will be another soggy spring.



Rep. McConkey attended the first bill signing of the session, which awarded \$21 million to flood relief across Iowa, including Western Iowa. Rep. McConkey was a co-sponsor of the bill.

School Funding Bill Delayed, Conflicts with Senate

House and Senate lawmakers have yet to resolve their differences on school funding for the upcoming school year. During debate on Tuesday, House Democrats offered a plan this week to invest \$133 (3%) million in public schools next year, but majority party lawmakers want to provide less.

School leaders across the state have said low state funding over the last decade isn't keeping up with rising costs and hampers their ability to train the next generation of Iowa workers. The proposals offered by majority party lawmakers does not keep pace with rising costs at schools and will lead to more school closings, higher class sizes, and fewer opportunities for students.

Iowans have always had great pride in our public schools. However, the state's new investment in public schools has been the lowest in Iowa history over the last decade leading to the closure of 126 schools in Iowa. The low funding means public schools have been forced to increase class sizes and raise property taxes to make up for the shortfall in state funding.

House majority party lawmakers prefer a \$110 million (2.5%) increase in basic funding for schools while Senate majority party lawmakers want just \$90 million (2.1%). The bill, Senate File 2142, is now back in the Iowa Senate as lawmakers try to resolve their differences.

By state law, the Legislature is required to enact school funding within 30 days to give school districts the time and ability to meet their required schedules for their budget decisions. The leaders of the current House and Senate will not be able to deliver school funding on-time this year as per the law.
